CHAIR'S REMARKS

No comments were made.

SOUTH ISLAND PROSPERITY PARTNERSHIP

The Interim CEO from the South Island Prosperity Partnership (SIPP) gave a presentation, and the following was noted in response to questions and during committee discussion:

- The "Victoria RISING" initiative was developed after consulting with approximately 400 stakeholders, drawing inspiration from cities around the world with similar values.
- SIPP aims to raise the city's profile without diminishing the significance of tourism.
- Victoria has the largest faculty of health informatics in North America, contributing to its growing life sciences sector.
- The Centre for Ocean Applied Sustainable Technologies (COAST), another SIPP initiative, brings together people, ideas, businesses, and communities to create a hub driving ocean technology and marine industry innovation.
- Indigenous representation is central to SIPP's work. The organization actively engages with Indigenous communities in areas such as training, employment, and retention.
- Before SIPP was founded, a roundtable was held with Indigenous Chiefs to determine if there was interest in regional economic development.
- SIPP hosted the Indigenous Prosperity Gathering, an economic development conference, in 2019.

- In May 2023, SIPP hosted a marine event where local Indigenous Chiefs shared their work on various initiatives, from fisheries and agriculture to coastal protection and spill response.
- The committee was encouraged to look up the Victoria Native Friendship Centre's Small Business Pledge Program for further learning opportunities.
- SIPP engages in government advocacy, focusing on what is working and what is not in areas such as procurement. They recently launched a procurement resource network to foster innovation.
- COAST serves as a vital connection between government and the private sector, and SIPP has partnered with provincial ministries in BC to advance trade and investment initiatives.
- The Island Coastal Economic Trust (ICET) does not extend to this region, adding to funding challenges.
- Victoria's economic base is different from the rest of Vancouver Island, making it complex to discuss an island-wide economic strategy. However, there are areas for coordination, such as an island-wide agriculture strategy.
- Regarding Saanich's economic development, SIPP collaborates with the municipality but does not focus on the land asset side of development.
- Saanich and SIPP work together to create opportunities in emerging sectors, such as life sciences and ocean/marine industries through initiatives like COAST.
- Destination Canada has launched a tourism corridor to boost economic development.
- SIPP is involved in facilitating cross-jurisdictional collaborations between governments and the private sector.
- SIPP is exploring how to engage with YYJ (Victoria International Airport) through a multi-stakeholder approach, recognizing YYJ as a significant driver of the local economy and tourism.
- Time and context are critical in regional development. The Capital Regional District (CRD) Board is working collaboratively to deliver services across boundary lines.
- Saanich's Economic Development Division is relatively new, and the committee expressed interest in solidifying this focus within the municipality.
- SIPP is currently in the fourth year of a five-year funding agreement with its municipal partners. They plan to explore a long-term agreement in the near future.
- Committee members were encouraged to re-apply as volunteer members. The application period closes on October 25, 2024, at 4:30 p.m.
