
Outdoor pickleball and tennis in Saanich Parks



2011-2019

Tennis courts at six parks have pickleball lines added to become 'shared courts'.

2015 Growing demand for pickleball (PB) facilities.

First dedicated PB courts built at Tolmie Park. 2016

2017 Dedicated PB courts built at McMinn Park. Noise complaints received about PB courts

at Tolmie Park from nearby residents.

2018 Sound-reducing panels installed at Tolmie Park, noise complaints continue.

Saanich Parks explores other mitigation measures for Tolmie Park; none are 2019/ successful. Council approves time restrictions at Tolmie, adopts guidelines for 2021 siting future pickleball courts, and moves to close Tolmie PB upon completion of new PB courts, at which time the PB court will be re-imagined into a more

appropriate sport court.

Time restrictions imposed on PB courts at Tolmie Park.

Six dedicated PB courts and 1 dedicated tennis court approved for Fowler Park.

The District of Saanich, Victoria, Esquimalt, and Oak Bay jointly fund 2023 a strategy to learn how to accommodate and manage pickleball.

(SPRING) The Pickleball Strategy for Victoria, Saanich, Oak Bay

and Esquimalt is completed (Pickleball Strategy).

(JUNE) Saanich Parks Staff meet with representatives of the tennis and pickleball communities to discuss current amenities, the Pickleball Strategy, and opportunities for improvement.

Conversations Summary

Tennis Meeting Summary, Key Take-Aways:

- Generally happy with level of service
- Shared courts don't work well, willing to lose them to gain dedicated courts
- Expressed desire for more hubs
- Prospect Lake courts not well used (too far out)

Pickleball Meeting Summary, Key Take-Aways:

- Victoria Regional Pickleball Assosiation 1000+ members
- Would like many more courts, preferably dedicated and indoors
- Recognize the challenges of siting them outdoors
- Don't think shared courts work well but better than nothing
- Support paddle-in system to reserve time on dedicated courts
- Owl paddles and sound mitigation significantly reduce noise level
- Prospect Lake courts not well used (too far out)
- Willing to help finance sound mitigation



Challenges





Tennis is the sport most impacted by pickleball. Shared courts are unpopular with both groups due to different game length and structure, difference in net height, and confusion caused by dual markings.



NOISE LEVELS

The noise generated by pickleball and the disturbance it can cause to neighbours is arguably pickleball's greatest challenge. If sound-reducing equipment becomes more commonly used, siting outdoor pickleball courts may be less challenging in future.



BUDGET AND LAND AVAILABILITY

The majority of outdoor parks are too close to homes, and sound attenuation can be expensive and difficult.




UNDER-SUPPLY OF FACILITIES

Greater Victoria has been struggling to meet the demands of the rapidly increasing pickleball community.

Council endorsed siting requirements

In 2021 Saanich Council approved guidelines for siting pickleball courts in Saanich:

- No courts within 50 m (164') of homes unless major sound abatement is installed.
- Courts between 50 m (164') and 110m (350') of residential structures require mitigation measures.
- Locations further away to be considered on a case-by-case basis.



Understanding tennis and pickleball requirements

To learn how to effectively manage pickleball, Saanich, Victoria, Esquimalt and Oak Bay jointly hired a consulting firm to complete a study called 'The Pickleball Strategy for Victoria, Saanich, Oak Bay and Esquimalt'. The Pickleball Strategy assesses needs and challenges, and makes recommendations to address them, however consultants did not conduct site assessments to confirm that their site-specific recommendations were feasible.






Expanding access to pickleball and tennis in outdoor parks




The Pickleball Strategy makes recommendations for courts at eight Saanich Parks.

The Parks Division reviewed these recommendations and assessed their site-specific feasibility. Saanich's recommendations are shown in the green column below.

Convert court furthest from homes to dedicated PB and add sound mitigation when funding permits.
Tolmie	2 dedicated pickleball and 1 dedicated tennis	Convert PB courts to tennis only or other use.	Remove PB lines and re-purpose courts, keep tennis court.	Remove PB lines from courts when Fowler complete, and re-purpose when funding permits.



Currently Saanich Parks provides:35 tennis courts (24 dedicated / 11 shared) and15 pickleball courts (4 dedicated / 11 shared)



After all Saanich recommendations are implemented, Saanich Parks will provide: 31 tennis courts (29 dedicated / 2 shared) and 18 pickleball courts (16 dedicated / 2 shared)





Upcoming and proposed projects




Fowler Park




Improvements are currently underway. Six new dedicated pickleball courts, and one new tennis court. Estimated completion in late 2025.

McMinn Park

The existing courts are proposed to be relined to result in 1 dedicated tennis court and 4 dedicated pickleball courts. Subject to future budget approvals.




Proposed court layout at: Copley W, Hampton, and Rosedale Parks




Saanich Parks - other actions





Court Booking

Saanich Parks is committed to serving the whole community, accommodating everyone from beginners to advanced players, individuals to organized groups, and spur-of-the moment play to matches organized well in advance. In line with the Pickleball Strategy, Saanich will offer a diversified allocation system including organizational and individual paid bookings, as well as free public drop-in. This mixed approach will cater to varying play preferences while optimizing court usage.



Paddle-In, Paddle-Out

This method of reserving a turn on the pickleball court is very popular in the Victoria area. It will be installed at McMinn Park on a trial basis, and if sucessful it may be installed at other dedicated PB courts.



Tolmie Park

The pickleball lines will be removed from the courts because of their proximity to homes. Saanich is reviewing possible new uses for this space.

Note: Pickleball will no longer be allowed on this court upon completion of new pickleball courts at Fowler Park.



Partnerships

Explore working with volunteers and organized groups to offer programming, and to manage pop-up / seasonal PB courts, as well as the potential to co-fund sound abatement.
